# WB-29 Longest Flights

Flying in WB-29s back in the early 1950s was an adventure in many ways. Many of us of us flew hundreds if not thousands of hours as non-crewmembers in the back end of unarmed, war-weary WB-29s. These aircraft had a history of in-flight engine fires, oil leaks and other mechanical problems. Aborted missions for mechanical problems were not unheard of. Two missions in particular come to mind.

We were flying when, near the end of the track, smoke started pouring out of one of the starboard engines. The pilot feathered the engine and debated whether to try and make it back to base or to the alternate. Since the latter tended to be fogged in a lot that time of the year, the pilot chose instead to turn back to base. Half way back, a second engine had to be feathered. And a third was shut down as we touched down. The remarkable thing was not that the near-crippled plane could fly the better part of a 13-hour mission with fewer engines than called for in its design. Also, there was no panic amongst the crew, no discernible fear, no second guessing. In fact, despite the critical engine problems, the recall looking across as the portside scanner sitting stoically on his bench, seemingly oblivious to what was happening around him, deeply engrossed in what he had been reading at the time - The Book of Mormon.

As fate would have it, I flew with that very same kid from Utah a year or so later. It was during the winter of 1955. The temperature was 50 degrees below zero when we took off from Eielson Air Force Base on a routine weather recon flight into the Artic Circle. Several hours into the flight, the intercom was filled with front-end chatter about having lost navigation and radio communications. The fact is we were lost at 18,000 feet over a vast and seemingly endless white carpet of frozen tundra with no beacon to guide us home. What happened next proved the truth of the old adage, "When in doubt, do the right thing." The pilot followed a hunch and turned the plane in the direction he hoped would take us back to Fairbanks, Alaska. The flight engineer did the right thing, too. He bought us time and distance by reducing engine power to the absolute minimum needed to keep the plane in the air. The tradeoff, of course, was that we would gradually lose altitude. Hours later, with the tundra looming up at us from 1,200 feet below - I glanced out the starboard scanner's blister and quickly pinched the throat mike. "Pilot, this is scanner. I can see two American jets approaching on our starboard side." None of us cheered out loud, but we sure smiled a lot until we touched down with 10 minutes fuel remaining. It was said that we flew 18 hours and 10 minutes on 15 hours fuel. It was also said it was the longest flight in WB-29 history.

And by the way, that scanner who I had flown with in Japan when three engines had to be feathered – he was there across from me in his seat next to the portside blister, his head back against the bulkhead, with his eyes closed and hands clasped across his lap - beneath an open copy of The Book of Mormon.

# Obituary for Marvin Gibson



Marvin R. Gibson, Jr. 75, was born on June 30, 1937, in Louisville, KY. He graduated from Louisville Male High School in 1955, after which he entered the Air Force in July 1955.

Marvin proudly served in the Air Force for the next 25 years with duty stations throughout the world including Illinois, Greenland, Azores, Georgia, Washington, D.C. California, Japan and Florida. Marvin separated from the Air Force in April 1959. He then reenlisted in the Air Force in May 1959, and was assigned to Robbins AFB, GA. He was subsequently assigned to Maxwell AFB, AL where he met and married Sue Ezell in February 1961.

In May 1961, Marvin was assigned to the Air Force Technical Applications Center (AFTAC) in Alexandria, VA. He spent his remaining years in the Air Force serving within the AFTAC organization. In 1963 Marvin was transferred to McClellan AFB, CA for training into the Airborne Data Collection System. Over the next years, assignments within AFTAC included an overseas base, McClellan AFB, CA and Patrick AFB, FL. Marvin accumulated over 5000 hours of flight time as a Special Equipment Operator. While serving overseas, he graduated from the University of Maryland with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business. Marvin later served with distinction as an Instructor in the Airborne Special Equipment Operators School at McClellan. During his assignment at McClellan, Marvin was awarded the Airman's Medal for the rescue of three small children from the Sacramento River. Marvin retired in June 1980, at the rank of Senior Master Sergeant, after 25 years of Honorable service to his country. Following his retirement from the Air Force, Marvin worked for Martin Marietta in Orlando, FL as Configuration Data Manager and McDonald Douglas in Titusville, Fl as Configuration Manager for the Tomahawk Cruise Missile Program. He worked at McDonald Douglas until he retired in November 1993. Marvin subsequently relocated to Robins AFB, GA and took employment with ARINC, LLC as the Configuration Manager for the Joint Stars Program. He once again took early retirement in 2005. Upon retirement from ARINC, Marvin and Sue relocated to Loveland, CO to be closer to their son and family.

In addition to the above achievements, Marvin was an active member of the Free and Accepted Mason's including membership in the following bodies: Blue Lodge, Kokusai 15; Longs Peak Lodge 197, Scottish Rite of Free Masonary, S.J., USA; Valley of Denver Orient of Colorado and Asiya Shriners of San Mateo, CA from 1973 until his death. Marvin served in various positions as an officer within the different bodies. Marvin is survived by his loving wife Sue, son Sean, grandchildren Barrett and Dylan Gibson plus other family members and good friends. Marvin is preceded in death by his parents Marvin R. and Mary L. Gibson, infant daughter and son John Jeffrey Gibson.

Monday, Oct 1st, 2012 Michael E. Lauger was born March 26, 1940, in Iron Mountain, Mich., to Earl and Anne Lauger. He was the oldest of four children. His family moved from Iron Mountain to Appleton, Wis., when he was 11 where they ran the Butte Des Morts golf course. Mike graduated from Neenah High School and shortly thereafter joined the U.S. Air Force. Mike married his high school sweetheart Barbara Olson on April 15, 1961. They had three children – Matt, Donna and Chris.

He attended college at Lake Superior College in Sault Ste. Marie, Mich. His 20 years in the Air Force included two remote assignments of one year each. He spent a year on Easter Island and a year in Thailand. His last assignment was to Detachment 459 in Boulder, Wyo., in 1976. He and his family found their home when they arrived in the Pinedale area. Mike made a sign for the back of his vehicle that read, "I am not a native but I got here as quick as I could." Before coming to Pinedale, he was stationed at Chanute AFB, Illinois; Kincheloe AFB, Michigan; Lowry AFB, Colorado; McClellan AFB California; Quintera Detachment in Chile near Vina del Mar and Wheeler AGB, Hawaii.

After retiring from the Air Force, Mike leased the Boulder Store & Pub for five years. He then had Sunburst Satellites. In 1989 he was hired to run the Rendezvous Meadows Golf Course, which he and Barbara ran for 17 years, retiring at the end of the 2005 season. Mike also got his private pilot's license and enjoyed flying for several years. His other interests included snowmachining, fishing and hunting. In his retirement Mike fished, did woodworking, rock hunting and tree planting. He loved to cook and fixed a family dinner once a week for his children and grandchildren, and he was a lifetime member of the VFW.

Mike always had a great sense of humor; two of his favorite sayings were: "Anybody could do it that way" and "never pass up the opportunity to shut up."
