

Honoring Veterans In Memoriam

At the Funeral or Memorial Service

- Request Military Funeral Honors: Eligible veterans are entitled to military honors, which can include the folding and presentation of the American flag to the family, the playing of Taps, and a three-volley salute.
- Obtain a Presidential Memorial Certificate: This signed paper certificate honors the veteran's memory and can be requested by the next of kin.
- Arrange for a Veteran's Marker or Headstone: A permanent marker or headstone is a way to commemorate a veteran's service and provide a dedicated place for remembrance.

During Memorial and Veterans Days

- Participate in Ceremonies : Attend local parades, wreath-laying ceremonies, and other events to show your gratitude.
- Fly the American Flag: Display the flag with proper etiquette to honor their service.
- **Support a Moment of Remembrance**: At 3:00 p.m. local time on Memorial Day, you can observe a moment of silence to reflect on the sacrifices made by military members.
- Wear a Red Poppy: The red poppy is a traditional symbol of remembrance for fallen service members.

Ongoing Ways to Honor a Veteran's Legacy

- **Preserve Their Story**: Document the veteran's life by creating a memory book or photo album, recording their stories, or submitting their information to a local history project or veterans' archive.
- Visit Their Resting Place: Regularly visit their grave or a significant location, cleaning the site and leaving an American flag or flowers.
- **Support Veteran-Focused Organizations**: Make donations to charities or organizations that support veterans, military families, or specific causes like training service dogs for veterans.
- **Educate Others**: Teach younger generations about the importance of military service and the sacrifices made by veterans to foster respect and appreciation.

To Volunteer or Not To Volunteer

I enjoyed basic training at Samson AFB in the Finger Lakes district of New York. One day I was asked if I would like to become a Tactical Instructor and without thinking, I said yes. Hindsight tells me that they needed the time to work on getting me a Top Secret clearance. Three months later I was assigned to Special Instruments Training, SPINSTRA. After completing my training, we stood in formation in the SPINSTRA compound graduating and the commanding officer asked if anyone would volunteer to be an instructor. Again, without thinking, I said yes. I received three weeks of instructor training and qualified for the Flying Ice Cream Cone wings. After enjoying teaching for two years, I found that a result of the new basic training format of six weeks at Lackland AFB and the remaining six weeks concurrent with set school, I was pulling KP every 9 days while my students were doing none! OK!

Enough of ATC! I requested transfer to WFO. The "A" commanding officer flew over to interview me and only said that I would need to extend my enlistment one year to make it worthwhile. No problem! Off to the real Air Force! Enjoying SEO training and flying at WFO was fantastic! So this is what the real Air Force looked like! I could have been there two years earlier! Having crew member wings along with flight and hazardous duty pay was a dream come true!

Then SPINSTRA sent WFO a request for me to come back TDY for three months to teach the "A" course. I was the only person to have taught at the school and have field experience. Again, without thinking, I said yes. I enjoyed Denver and teaching and had many friends there, so it sounded like a good decision. I gave the keys of my Austin Healy to a buddy. I had a great time at Lowry and not only taught the course but wrote the syllabus for the course. I got my third stripe while there. However, there was a master sergeant existing there who I was not warned about! He was not in my training squadron, but one morning, as I was leaving the brick barracks with my hands in my pockets this man bellowed at me from out on the street, "Airman! Are your hands cold?"; I replied, "Yes, they are." When I reached him he angrily dressed me down for it! He then took me to the Air Police office and rambled on about my conduct claiming I had sworn at him! The AP was clearly not interested so he took me over to his CO. He told me to wait while he went in to talk to the CO. When he came out, he calmly said, "Please report to your CO! Please!? Boy! What a change! When I reported to my CO, he said, "Stay out of that man's way. He is known as a hot-head." Then I remembered one of the many reasons for leaving ATC! I completed my assignment and flew back to my beloved real Air Force!

Checking back into the barracks, my buddy returned my keys and said that the OSI wanted to see me! The OSI!? He had been stopped at one of the internal base checkpoints and they searched the car and found electronic parts in the trunk. That was not unusual, because i would do that often when going to the flight line to do repairs to our equipment. It was faster that going to the motor pool to get a truck and then return it. When I went to the OSI, he read me my rights! That is not a good omen! I gave him the above explanation and he said that was fine and that there would be no further action. Whew!

When I got to WFO, the "A" CO gave me a letter of commendation from the SPINSTRA CO, complimenting me highly on my performance while there! I'm back on top! Then...... The new WFO commander wrote me a letter of reprimand about the OSI event! Stunned, that night I joyfully burned the letter in front of my buddies! Thereafter, I really thought over the situation when asked to volunteer for anything! I still volunteered a lot, but only after looking at possible risks!

The Size of the Stars

My father was Retired Navy and a Boy Scout Leader. One of the services his boys performed was the destruction of old and damaged US flags. In many cases, he would cut the stars out of the flag, put them in small plastic gem bags and hand them out to other Veterans. I was the recipient of one such star that encouraged me to continue the tradition.

When he passed away, my sister gave me the two US flags that Dad had flown over his house. These were a great platform for me to start my new quest. I created the 100 stars and had no problems handing them out to friends, family and veterans at the American Legion Post I belong to.



One day, I was informed by the Post that they had received a large Garrison Flag for destruction, and if I was

interested in the star field. I was amazed at the size of the 17-inch stars and thought hard about how to use them. Obviously, they would not fit in someone's pocket, let alone the small gem bag.

While deciding on the use of the stars, I tried to determine the size of the entire flag. I found, on the internet, that there is a standard for flag dimensions. I also

found an online Flag Calculator where you input one known dimension of the flag and it would give you the

remaining sizes. By inputting the size of the star from point to point (also known as the diameter), the application told me the entire flag was 23 feet wide, 44 feet long, and the stripes were 21 inches wide.

I located 20-inch shadow boxes at IKAEA that worked great to frame the stars. The first star went to my Sister, who is a Commander in the Navy and was my dad's primary caretaker. The second went to the American Legion Post.

I continue to make the Pocket Stars as well as the Garrison Stars. Recently, we went to Disneyland, where I was prepared with a great number of stars to give away. I was disappointed by how few people wore veteran hats, camouflage clothing, or talked about their service time. I can't ask EVERYONE I come across if they served. In the end, I gave away only 5 stars.

We are going back in December, where I plan to wear a hat displaying my status as a Veteran and a button asking to tell me if they are a Veteran. Maybe I can give away a whole flag's worth of stars.
